Evidence Based Practice (EBP) requires us to identify and make use of the highest-quality, scientific evidence as one component of our efforts to provide optimal speech/language services.

"EBP implies not that we upend everything that we know, but rather that we upgrade our knowledge based in response to particular clinical questions in a judicious and conscientious manner described in the definition of EBP" (Dollaghan, C., ASHA Leader, April 13, 2004).
